As we look ahead, the village work continues in maintaining our streets, sewers and parks as well as actively planning to move into the new street and parks facility currently under construction. This major project is targeted for completion in early September. Work continues north of Festival Foods in the creation of housing opportunities as well as ongoing work in constructing news homes on the west end of the former mill site. Work will be done this year in completing a scenic overlook along the Fox River between the Oasis building and the Kaukauna utilities dam. This project includes the refurbishing of the last remaining building associated with the Kimberly Mill and will become a place for sitting and gazing as well as a space available for small gatherings like wedding or baby showers and alike.

Businesses are active as well with the former Express Convenience store transforming to a BBQ shop along with a barbering facility. The former "Clubhouse" now owned by Patrick DeJesus is undergoing a transformation of the first floor to accommodate a wine bar, and the former BEST carwash will be re-purposed to provide workspace for several different trades, Crane Engineering is expanding its facility within the business park and Aspire will be adding on to their facility as well. Our Community Development Director, Sam, continues to work with potential businesses to build within the business park along Kimberly Avenue as well as addressing the former Specialty Minerals plant at the end of Sidney Street. Busy times to be sure with plenty of planning for a brighter future.

The village team will be active in the months ahead in removing ash trees, maintaining streets, providing safety through policing, fire protection and Emergency Response teams. The central office team will continue to work in meeting your needs for paying water bills, licensing your pets and answering any questions you might have. The work in the central office involves many phone calls and stop ins at the counter and the staff works hard to get the answers to your questions and concerns. In an effort to balance the workload for our professional staff, we have made the decision to have the counter closed on Friday afternoons. The time without phone calls etc. will allow for much needed uninterrupted work time as staff completes reports, engages in training, aligns all departments with consistent interaction time and has focus time for solid teambuilding. Much like a teacher's "in service" time, we see this allocation of time to have a positive impact on the productivity of our team for the long haul and all of us will benefit. On line bill paying and our drop box are available always.

Yes, so much to plan for, so many opportunities to engage, such a view of bright days ahead as we work together in keeping Kimberly a great place to live, learn, work and play.

# Kimberly Library has a New Look - same friendly service!

Rooted at the Heart of Kimberly, the library delights in delivering an amazing lineup of entertaining, educational, and inspirational materials, programs, and services to

Kimberly residents and visitors. Now, Kimberly Public Library has a new look as well, that has taken shape in a new logo design.

The idea to explore a new brand and define the library's current identity stemmed from the dissolution of the joint library partnership with Little Chute which ended in December 2020.

The first few years of the return to the stand-alone library model were formative. In that time, effort was put into developing and solidifying operational basics like staffing and funding. More recently, over the course of the past year, the library has been working on a branding process which has resulted in a new logo.

For the Kimberly Library, rebranding provides a way to better promote the library's refreshed identity, a nod to community values, people-centered service, and our collective story. The logo and the brand story behind it positions library staff and activities as more recognizable throughout the community.

The new logo is a meaningful reflection of the values Kimberly residents hold dear: history, community connections, and making a difference. The logo design draws inspiration from tree rings, a nod to Kimberly's roots in the timber industry, and ripples on water, representing the Fox River that borders the Village's north side. As the brand story goes, these elements symbolize how the library creates ripples in early literacy, cultural awareness, small business development, and social connection that affect the entire community.

In fact, the library has always had a small but impactful presence in Kimberly. Many don't know that the Kimberly Public Library was created in 1907 – before the Village itself was incorporated, by a man who would later become Village President. It began as a Dutch lending library for the growing Dutch community of immigrants who settled here. The library contained only 50 books at its beginning, but these 50 books had a lasting impact we still feel today. Small but impactful is what we still strive for. While library services have grown and expanded, we still hope that everything we do as a library—no matter how big—will have a positive and lasting ripple effect on Kimberly and beyond.

The library image is meant to strengthen meaningful connections that individuals make while engaging with the library – connections to everything the library has to offer: materials, artistic creators, new ideas, people, experiences, opportunities to learn and grow in all stages of life, information, social connections, freedoms that libraries protect to ensure the right to express ideas, and a safe place where every person is welcome to feel like they somehow belong. The library provides equal access to these connections and to foundational values for all who wish to partake. And the library's story lies at the heart of these connections, discoverable at the intersection of the stories of all who choose to cross paths with the library in one way or another.

As we embrace this exciting new chapter, the library's mission remains the same: Bringing People Together to Inspire a Love of Reading and Life-Long Learning. We aim to provide a welcoming space, foster a love of reading, and offer engaging programs and educational opportunities to all who wish to make a third home with the Kimberly Library. Kimberly Public Library is, and will always be, rooted at the heart of the community.



## **Construction Projects 2025 and Beyond**

**Marcella St Trail** The Village of Kimberly was awarded funding through the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. This multimodal trail connection will link existing infrastructure at Kennedy Avenue and Cobblestone Lane with a concrete trail along Kennedy Avenue all the way to Kimberly Avenue along Marcella Street. The project is scheduled to begin in April 2025 with a final completion of October 2025. We'll post more updates here and on our Facebook page as construction nears.

**Sidewalk Reconstruction** 2025 will see the return of the sidewalk reconstruction project. Hazardous sidewalks within the 2025 area will be either replaced or have the trip hazard sawed off. Both options are utilized to make the best use of budget dollars to maintain a safe walking corridor.

**RRFBs – Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons** At the end of 2024 rapid flashing beacons were installed at three intersections and there are plans for three more in 2025. The beacons that were installed on Kennedy will get bumps out this summer in conjunction with the Kimberly diamond grind/ panel replacement project. Beacons will also be installed at Kimberly and Railroad and at Maes and Papermill Run for the trail crossings.

Kennedy Ave Railroad to the East Another highly anticipated project will be a diamond grind, dowel bar retro fit and panel replacement of Kennedy Ave. First, a diamond grind of the entire roadway will be done followed by removal of cracked and defective panels. Once that is complete the remaining panels will be cut into a specific pattern to allow dowel bars to be installed at the joints. The diamond grind will smooth out the ride of the road and the dowel bars will prevent the panels from moving in the future and extend the life of this road for many more years. ## For Tire Pick Up

As a result of changes made by Outagamie County, there is now a charge for tire pick up. Each tire for curbside collection will incur a fee of \$15.00, and the collection day is set for April 16th. Passenger tires up to 19" are accepted, along with rims. However, tires from businesses will not be collected. Payment can be submitted in person at the Village Complex or by calling 788-7507. Please note that a processing fee will be added when paying with a debit/credit card.

# STREET DEPARTMENT

## Kimberly Water Department Semi Annual Hydrant Flushing

The Kimberly Water Department will be cleaning and flushing water mains from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm beginning **April 21st – 24th and April 28th – May 1st.** The flushing will remove most of the natural minerals that have settled in the mains such as iron, a harmlessreddish brown mineral that does discolor the water.

If you observe Water Utility Personnel working in your area, refrain from using water or use as little as possible for 45 minutes to ensure that the water has settled in the mains. This will also help prevent any iron from being drawn into your water piping system.

If you do find that your water has become discolored, refrain from using it for an additional 30 minutes. Then draw off the remaining discolored water through the **COLD WATER FAUCET ONLY.** 

Your cooperation during this flushing procedure will benefit all water customers.

## Spring Yard Waste Clean Up

Curbside yard waste will be picked up on May 5th for residents north of tracks and May 12th for residents south of tracks. Garden debris, flowers, lawn edgings, and shrub trimmings (not to exceed 18" in length) will be picked up. Material **MUST BE PLACED IN BROWN PAPER LAWN AND YARD WASTE BAGS** and not to exceed 50 lbs. Yard waste stickers are <u>NOT</u> required during the spring yard waste clean up. *No Grass Clippings to include thatching from your lawn!* 

Branches longer than 18" require a special pickup on Thursdays. Residents must call 788-7507 or email streets@vokimberlywi.gov prior to 3:00 PM on Wednesday to schedule a Thursday brush pickup.

The Village has a yard waste site available to residents every day from 6 am to 8 pm, all year round. To access the site, an annual permit is necessary. Security cameras are in place to monitor the area. Anyone not following the rules may face enforcement action. For additional details, please visit the Village website at www.vokimberlywi.gov.

# WATER UTILITY PUBLIC NOTICE

### February 2025

- What: Public Notice of Violation Regarding Lead and Copper Rule Revisions (LCRR)
- Why: Failure to Submit an Adequate Inventory for Service Line Materials

Location: Kimberly Waterworks (Water System ID #44503426)

Kimberly's water system recently violated a drinking water requirement, and the utility is required to provide Public Notice (PN) to all our residents and others using our water. This is not an emergency, but as our customers, you have a right to know: (1) What happened, (2) What we've done to correct this situation, and (3) What can be done to reduce your exposure to lead in drinking water.

### What Happened?

As required by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), during 2023 and 2024, the Village of Kimberly worked to develop an Inventory of materials for every one of our water service lines serving individual customers, with the specific intention of looking for lead. Lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. This effort included reviewing construction and maintenance records and performing in-house inspections. The Inventory spreadsheet and other required material were submitted to the DNR on time for the October 16, 2024, deadline. Upon the DNR's review, they identified clerical mistakes that the DNR felt did not conform to the requirements, and we received a violation notice on January 24, 2025.

### What has been done to correct the Violation?

The Village has been able to easily address all these clerical violations issued by the DNR. We have reviewed and corrected our Inventory, the Inventory is being resubmitted to DNR. The Inventory will also be made available on the Village's website.

### What does this mean? This is not an emergency.

If it had been, you would have been notified within 24 hours. Typically, lead enters water supplies by leaching from lead pipes, brass faucets, plumbing with leaded solder, and other plumbing components containing lead. In homes with lead pipes that connect the home to the water main, also known as lead services lines, these pipes are typically the most significant source of lead in the water. Lead pipes are more likely to be found in older cities



and homes built before 1986. Service lines made of galvanized iron or steel that are (or were previously) downstream of lead service lines are classified as galvanized requiring replacement (GRR). Identifying and ultimately removing lead and GRR service lines is an important way to protect public health. Among homes without lead service lines, the most common problem is with brass or chrome-plated brass faucets and plumbing with lead solder. In the coming months we will be developing a plan to resolve the uncertainties, which we are required to do in the next 10 years.

#### What are the health effects of lead in drinking water?

Exposure to lead in drinking water can cause serious health effects in all age groups. Infants and children can have decreases in IQ and attention span. Lead exposure can lead to new learning and behavior problems or exacerbate existing learning and behavior problems. The children of women who are exposed to lead before or during pregnancy can have increased risk of these adverse health effects. Adults can have increased risks of heart disease, high blood pressure, kidney or nervous system problems.

#### What should I do to reduce exposure to lead in drinking water?

- If you have a water filter, be sure to use it properly. Using a filter can reduce lead in drinking water. Make sure you use a filter certified to remove lead. Read the directions to learn how to properly install and use your cartridge and when to replace it. Using the cartridge after it has expired can make it less effective at removing lead. Do not run hot water through the filter.
- Clean your aerator. Regularly clean your faucet's screen (also known as an aerator). Sediment, debris, and lead particles can collect in your aerator. If lead particles are caught in the aerator, lead can get into your water.
- Use cold water. Use only cold water for drinking, cooking and making baby formula. Remember, boiling water does not remove lead from water.
- Run your water. The more time water has been sitting in pipes, the more lead it may contain. Before drinking, flush your home's pipes by running the tap, taking a shower, doing laundry, or doing a load of dishes. The amount of time to run the water will depend on whether your home has a lead service line or not, and the length of the lead service line. Residents should contact their water utility for recommendations about flushing times in their community.
- Learn if you have a lead service line\*\*. Find out if the pipe that connects your home to the water main (called a service line) is made from lead. Ask your water utility or if your utility doesn't have information a licensed plumber may be able to assist. "Protect Your Tap: A Quick Check for Lead" is EPA's step by step guide to learn how to find lead pipes in your home, which can be found at www.epa.gov/ground-water-and-drinkingwater/protect-your-tap-quick-check-lead.
- Learn about construction in your neighborhood. If you have a lead service line, you should be aware of any nearby construction or maintenance work that could disturb the line. Ground tremors from construction may suddenly cause more lead to be released from lead service lines in the area. (*cont'd*)

• Have your water tested. Contact your water utility to have your water tested and to learn more about the lead levels in your drinking water.

### Conclusion

This notice has been sent to all customers of the Village's water utility and to known apartment-dwellers who do not receive a water bill. Do you know anyone who you believe may not have received this notice? If so, please share this information with all the other people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (for example, people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses). You can do this by posting this notice in a public place or distributing copies by hand or mail. For more information about the Inventory, please contact the Water Department at 920-788-7522.

## Water Rates

At its January 14th, 2025, meeting, the Kimberly Water Commission authorized Administrator Block to begin the process of a water rate study. The water rate study is one of the requirements of the Public Service Commission (PSC) before it would consider allowing the Kimberly Water Utility to increase the water, meter, and/or hydrant rates.

Kimberly Water Utility last completed a water rate study and increase in 2019. The current rates do not adequately cover expenses. The study, done by an independent consultant, will analyze all the details regarding Kimberly's water system and service and then calculate the costs anticipated to maintain the system and services. Until the study is done, the Utility cannot anticipate what, if any, rate increase the PSC would approve.

Currently for a single-family house, the water rate is \$3.82 per 1,000 gallons, the meter fee is \$18.00 per quarter and the hydrant (fire protection) fee is \$16.50 per quarter. Any potential increase would not take effect until the Fall of 2025 at the earliest. We will have further information available in upcoming issues of the Kim-Talk and public meetings as required by the PSC.

## **Dog Licenses**

In accordance with State Statutes and Village Ordinance, dogs must be licensed annually, and must be done so within 30 days of residency in the Village. 2025 dog licenses are now available at the Village Complex. When applying for a dog license, owners must present the current rabies vaccination certificate. Every dog 5 months or older must have a current Rabies shot. Neutered and Spayed Licenses are \$7.00, intact Dog Licenses are \$12.00. Failure to license your dog may result in a \$124.00 citation per dog, issued by FVMPD. Late fee applied after March 31st.

### **Reminder Of Ordinaces In Place For Dog Owners**

Village Ordinance 180-6 C. All dogs, cats or other domestic animals shall be kept on a leash no longer than eight feet at all times when off the premises of its owner.

Village Ordinance 180-10 Animal feces – The owner or person in charge of any dog, cat, or other animal shall not permit solid fecal matter of such animal to deposit on any street, alley or other public or private property unless such matter is immediately removed therefrom by said owner or person in charge.

## Keep up the Great Work!

Thanks to your efforts, there has been a decrease in the number of false alarms caused by dead batteries or smoke and carbon monoxide detectors reaching their 7-year service life. Keep it up by regularly replacing batteries in spring and fall, and checking the age of your detectors. It's important to remember that batteries and new detectors are quite affordable, considering they are crucial for your safety.

## 2024 Call Volume Recap

Between January 1, 2024 and December 31, 2024, Kimberly Fire & Kimberly EMS attended to a total of 683 service calls. A service call refers to a request for assistance made to the Outagamie County Communication Center (911 Dispatch). This call volume averages just under 2 calls per day throughout the year.

Prescribed burns, also known as controlled burns, are used in native planting spaces to control invasive and noxious weeds. A prescribed fire



for native prairies is a carefully planned and controlled burn intentionally set under specific weather conditions to mimic natural fire cycles, thereby maintaining the health of the prairie ecosystem by stimulating native plant growth, controlling invasive species, and improving wildlife habitat. In the coming weeks or months, you may notice that our fire department will be setting these fires. Scheduled locations for Spring 2025 include Treaty Park Pond, Memorial Pond and Sunset Pond. The pictures above show the burning of the Sunset Park Pond in 2024.
