President's Point of View

Orange Barrels, Orange Cones, Orange Flags... Must be a New Season

Winter and construction have been descriptors for Wisconsin seasons and throughout the village it appears we are in the latter season! The orange barrels, cones and flags represent progress; allow me to explain.

Work along Marcella Street and Kennedy Avenue is the construction of a connecting multimodal trail. This work is possible through grant funding and will provide improved safety for walkers, joggers and bike enthusiasts with contiguous trail access from Washington to Kimberly Ave/Newberry. This work should be substantially complete by late May with a small portion over the railroad tracks to be completed later this summer. The railroad portion requires cooperation with the railroad and we are hopeful they expedite the process.

When school goes to summer recess we will be addressing the bumpy ride along Kennedy Avenue from Washington (Cty N) to John Street. This work will take most of the summer to complete as solutions are implemented to grind, dowel and smooth out the roadway.

We Energies is snaking gas line upgrades throughout the village and sidewalk rehabilitation will be happening throughout the village to address cracked and heaved sidewalk blocks as a part of our annual "green dot" program. We will continue to mark walks needing work and have budgeted for the program to continue each summer for years to come.

Work on the Village's Municipal Services Center continues with a projected completion in late September/early October. Replacing the more than sixty-year-old facility has been hampered with weather conditions and unearthing of soils that needed special care in disposal. While these interruptions have slowed the project; our contractor has worked diligently to keep the project on

track. When complete, this new facility will provide safe housing for trucks used in maintaining our streets, parks and sewers. We anticipate an open house to "show off" YOUR new building in mid-October. This building will be the home base for permitting, street, park and recreation programming and more. As we get closer to the staff moving in to the space, we will update everyone as to what services are housed in the new Municipal Services Center and which services remain in the Municipal Complex/Village Hall.

We look forward to the first "full season" of splash pad access and we invite everyone to consider a swim lake pass for summertime relaxation. Of course there are many other opportunities for summertime activity ranging from youth and adult baseball/softball, library programs for young and seasoned patrons, performances by the Kimberly Community Band, music on Sunday evenings at the Amphitheatre and so much more. Our Community Development Director, Sam, is working with property owners where some cleanup may be needed to stay in compliance with community ordinance. We strive to maintain a clean and inviting community and ask everyone to be aware of their property maintenance. It is certainly not the preference of the village to have to be the "enforcer" but we will continue to address any conditions that fail to be in compliance.

Please be patient, aware and safe in work zones and know that the inconveniences today yield progress ahead as we continue our work in keeping Kimberly a great place to live, learn, work and play.

Friendly Code Enforcement Reminder

It is unlawful to park a vehicle and/or trailer in your front lawn except on an approved driveway. All vehicles, regardless of where they are stored on-site, must also be registered, licensed and maintained in an operable condition. If you are considering expanding your driveway, a permit is required. All driveways shall be hard surfaced with asphalt, concrete or another agreed upon material. Summertime Stormwater Tip

Stormwater is rain or snowmelt and water from things people do, like washing the car or watering the lawn. As water makes its way to the storm drain it picks up pollutants like oil from car leaks and bacteria from pet waste. When we choose products carefully and dispose of products properly, we can greatly reduce the amount of pollution that enters our local waters through runoff. Untreated runoff is the biggest threat to our nation's water quality, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Let's make the small, important changes that will reduce that threat and improve water quality and our lives! Could washing our cars at home be contributing to greenish waterways and algae blooms? Washing one vehicle may not seem like an issue, but collective car washing in our neighborhoods and towns can add up to a big problem for local water bodies if that wash water goes down our storm drains. If you choose to wash your vehicle at home, wash on an area that absorbs water, like gravel or grass. This can filter dirty wash water before it enters groundwater, lakes, or rivers via storm drains. Also, be sure to use biodegradable, phosphate-free, water-based cleaners and always empty wash buckets into sinks or toilets and NOT down a storm drain! Visit RenewOurWaters.org for more tips.

LAWN & WEED NOTICE

TO PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE VILLAGE OF KIMBERLY

Pursuant to the Village of Kimberly Code of Ordinances, notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies, or controls land in the Village of Kimberly, Outagamie County, State of Wisconsin, to destroy all noxious weeds and to cut or remove the accumulation or growth of weeds, grass, brush or other rank or offensive vegetation which has grown to a height greater than eight (8) inches.

Owners who do not maintain their property will be charged \$75.00 per hour, plus equipment usage. A minimum of one hour will be charged to cut noxious weeds or grass 8 inches or longer.

Grass Cutting Reminder

When cutting your lawn near the street, try to make your first two passes with the discharge chute directed away from the street. Grass can clog up storm sewer catch basins, which doesn't allow the street to drain properly. Water that drains from the street and into storm sewers ends up in the river, along with all the grass clippings. Grass clippings also hold fertilizer and pesticides that contaminate streams, rivers, and lakes. The DNR encourages leaving grass clippings on your lawn, as they can act as good nutrients, as well as composting your lawn clippings. Residents who blow grass clippings into the street are subject to a citation per ordinance 430-16, 430-17.

Tree Care For Newly Planted Trees

The Village of Kimberly street department will care for and water newly planted trees for the first 2 years. During the third season we will remove the stakes, mulch and reseed around the tree. After that, it will be the abutting owner's responsibility to water and care for the seeding to encourage turf growth. If during the 3rd year, we have periods of drought, we encourage residents to water trees to continue encouraging the growth and establishment of the newly planted trees.

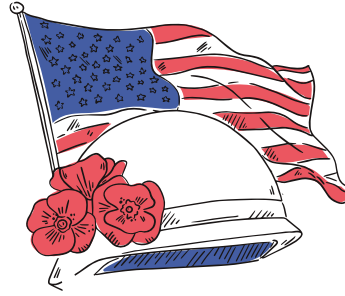

Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety

Summer and the nice weather inspire us to go outdoors and enjoy the few months of warm, sunshine-filled days that we have. This often means more pedestrian and recreational vehicle traffic on our roadways and trails.

Motorists should be alert for more bicycles on the roadways and bicyclists should make an effort to be seen. The use of highly visible clothing and appropriate lighting on bikes can improve safety. Bicyclists are also reminded that they are subject to the laws related to traffic signals just as those operating motor vehicles are.

Be safe and respectful on trails and parkways. Many have speed regulations especially for eBike usage. Kindly alert walkers when approaching to pass them.

Bike helmets can save lives – please wear one. Runners and walkers: State law mandates that if you walk or run in the roadway, you must do so facing traffic.

Amplified Music

Motorists playing music or any sound producing device from within the vehicle are required to keep the volume at a legal level. Wis. State law:

Chapter 346.96

(16) Radios or other electric sound amplification devices.

(a) Except as provided in s. 347.38 (1), no person may operate or park, stop or leave standing a motor vehicle while using a radio or other electric sound amplification device emitting sound from the vehicle that is audible under normal conditions from a distance of 75 or more feet, unless the electric sound amplification device is being used to request assistance or warn against an unsafe condition.

While many of us like to enjoy our favorite tunes and roll with the windows down, the loud sound can be a distraction and prevent motorists from hearing the siren of an approaching emergency vehicle.

Pets in Cars

While many of our favorite furry friends enjoy riding with us, their safety should come first. Law enforcement receives many calls during the summer regarding pets left in vehicles.

Health Information

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Definitions

AL Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

HA and HAL Health Advisory: An estimate of acceptable drinking water levels for a chemical substance based on health effects information. HAL: Health Advisory Level is a concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post public notice. Health Advisories are determined by US EPA.

MCL Maximum Contaminant Level: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

MCLG Maximum Contaminant Level Goal: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

pCi/l: picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)

ppm: parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)

ppb: parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l)

ppt: parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

ppq: parts per quadrillion, or picograms per liter

PHGS: Public Health Groundwater Standards are found in NR 140 Groundwater Quality. The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice.

RPHGS: Recommended Public Health Groundwater Standards: Groundwater standards proposed by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice.

SMCL: Secondary drinking water standards or Secondary Maximum Contaminant Levels for contaminants that affect taste, odor, or appearance of the drinking water. The SMCLs do not represent health standards.

Detected Contaminants

Your water was tested for many contaminants last year. We are allowed to monitor for some contaminants less frequently than once a year. The following tables list only those contaminants which were detected in your water. If a contaminant was detected last year, it will appear in the following tables without a sample date. If the contaminant was not monitored last year, but was detected within the last 5 years, it will appear in the tables below along with the sample date.

Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule (UCMR 5)

Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. The purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulation is warranted. EPA required us to participate in this monitoring.

Within the last 12 months we conducted Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring in accordance with US EPA rules. We are required to inform you of this sampling. We are only required to include results showing detections within this report; however, if you would like a copy of all results, please contact us at (920) 2788-7510. Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. The purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulation is warranted. EPA required us to participate in this monitoring. UCMR 5 included testing for 29 PFAS and Lithium compounds. Our water system did not have any detected results of PFAS compounds in 2023. Lithium was found in the range of 9.3 (ppb) to 12 (ppb)

Additional Health Information

Lead can cause serious health effects in people of all ages, especially pregnant people, infants (both formula-fed and breastfed), and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and parts used in service lines and in home plumbing. Kimberly Waterworks is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes but cannot control the variety of materials used in the plumbing in your home. Because lead levels may vary over time, lead exposure is possible even when your tap sampling results do not detect lead at one point in time. You can help protect yourself and your family by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Using a filter, certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead, is effective in reducing lead exposures. Follow the instructions provided with the filter to ensure the filter is used properly. Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, and making baby formula.

Boiling water does not remove lead from water. Before using tap water for drinking, cooking, or making baby formula, flush your pipes for several minutes. You can do this by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. If you have a lead service line or galvanized requiring replacement service line, you may need to flush your pipes for a longer period. Actions Taken

What Happened?

As required by EPA and DNR, during 2023 and 2024, the Village of Kimberly worked to develop an Inventory of materials for every one of our water service lines serving individual customers, with the specific intention of looking for lead. Lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. This effort included reviewing construction and maintenance records and performing in-house inspections. The Inventory spreadsheet and other required material were submitted to the DNR on time for October 16, 2024, deadline. Upon DNR's review, they identified clerical mistakes that the DNR felt did not conform to the requirements, and we received a violation notice on January 24, 2025.

What has been done to correct the Violation?

The Village has been able to easily address all these clerical violations issued by the DNR. We have reviewed and corrected our Inventory; the Inventory is being resubmitted to DNR. The Inventory will also be made available on the Village's website.

Exposure to lead in drinking water can cause serious health effects in all age groups. Infants and children can have decreases in IQ and attention span. Lead exposure can lead to new learning and behavior problems or exacerbate existing learning and behavior problems.
