President's POINT OF VIEW

Curbside Yard Waste Collection:

- Yard waste consists of lawn rakings, shrub trimmings (not to exceed 18"), weeds, lawn edgings and garden debris. For curbside collection, this material must be placed in a brown biodegradable paper bag and a special sticker must be attached to each bag. Stickers are available for \$1.00 at the Municipal Services Center (MSC) and Village Complex. Residents needing a yard waste pick-up must call the MSC at 788-7507 or email streets@vokimberlywi.gov and be placed on a list. All yard waste must be set out on the terrace by 6:00 a.m.

SUMMERTIME STORMWATER TIPS

Stormwater is rain or snowmelt and water from things people do, like washing the car or watering the lawn. As water makes its way to the storm drain it picks up pollutants like oil from car leaks and bacteria from pet waste. When we choose products carefully and dispose of products properly, we can greatly reduce the amount of pollution that enters our local waters through runoff. Untreated runoff is the biggest threat to our nation's water quality, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Let's make the small, important changes that will reduce that threat and improve water quality and our lives! Washing one vehicle may not seem like an issue, but collective car washing in our neighborhoods and towns can add up to a big problem for local water bodies if that wash water goes down our storm drains. If you choose to wash your vehicle at home, wash on an area that absorbs water, like gravel or grass. This can filter dirty wash water before it enters groundwater, lakes, or rivers via storm drains. Also, be sure to use biodegradable, phosphate-free, water-based cleaners and always empty wash buckets into sinks or toilets and NOT down a storm drain! Visit RenewOurWaters.org for more tips.



Village Construction Updates

Work has already started on Schindler Dr for sewer and water reconstruction. Once Village utility work is completed, WE Energies will replace gas main and services. In July, the contractor will move in and begin concrete pavement work.



Utility and pavement reconstruction will also be completed on the alley between Pine and Walnut this summer, along with WE Energies' gas main and services.

Hazardous sidewalk replacement and sawcutting will take place in the zone south of the railroad tracks and in various areas of the village by a contracted company and village staff.



We appreciate your patience and cooperation as these important infrastructure improvements are completed.

LAWN & WEED NOTICE

To Property Owners in the Village of Kimberly: Pursuant to the Village of Kimberly Code of Ordinances, notice is hereby given to each person who owns, occupies, or controls land in the Village of Kimberly, Outagamie County, State of Wisconsin, to destroy all noxious weeds and to cut or remove the accumulation or growth of weeds, grass, brush or other rank or offensive vegetation which has grown to a height greater than eight (8) inches.

Owners who do not maintain their property will be charged \$75.00 per hour, plus equipment usage and a \$25 administrative fee. A minimum of one hour will be charged to cut noxious weeds or grass 8 inches or longer.



TREE CARE FOR NEWLY PLANTED TREES

The Village of Kimberly street department will care for and water newly planted trees for the first 2 years. During the third season we will remove the stakes, mulch and reseed around the tree. After that, it will be the abutting owner's responsibility to water and care for the seeding to encourage turf growth. If during the 3rd year, we have periods of drought, we encourage residents to water trees to continue encouraging the growth and establishment of the newly planted trees.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Definitions

AL: Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

HA and HAL: Health Advisory - An estimate of acceptable drinking water levels for a chemical substance based on health effects information. Health Advisory Level is a concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, posts a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice. Health Advisories are determined by US EPA.

Level 1 Assessment: A study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system.

Level 2 Assessment: A very detailed study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why an E. coli MCL violation has occurred or why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system, or both, on multiple occasions.

MCL: Maximum Contaminant Level - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCL's are set as close to the MCLG's as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

MCLG: Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety.

MFL: million fibers per liter

MRDL: Maximum residual disinfectant level - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

MRDLG: Maximum residual disinfectant level goal - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLG's do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

pCi/l: picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)

ppm: parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)

ppb: parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l)

ppt: parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

ppq: parts per quadrillion, or picograms per liter

SMCL: Secondary drinking water standards or Secondary Maximum Contaminant Levels for contaminants that affect taste, odor, or appearance of the drinking water. The SMCL's do not represent health standards.

TCR: Total Coliform Rule

Detected Contaminants

Your water was tested for many contaminants last year. We are allowed to monitor for some contaminants less frequently than once a year. The following tables list only those contaminants which were detected in your water. If a contaminant was detected last year, it will appear in the following tables without a sample date. If the contaminant was not monitored last year, but was detected within the last 5 years, it will appear in the tables below along with the sample date.

Unregulated Contaminants

Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. The purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulation is warranted. EPA required us to participate in this monitoring. UCMR 5 included testing for 29 PFAS and Lithium compounds. Our water system did not have any detected results of PFAS compounds in 2023. Lithium was found in the range of 9.3 (ppb) to 12 (ppb)

Additional Health Information

Lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Kimberly Waterworks is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in your home. You share the responsibility for protecting yourself and your family from the lead in your home plumbing. You can take responsibility by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Before drinking tap water, flush your pipes for several minutes by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. You can also use a filter certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead in drinking water. If you are concerned about lead in your water and wish to have your water tested, contact Kimberly Waterworks at (920) 284-1920. Municipal Update: Police Services Coverage Enhancement

The Village is committed to maintaining a high standard of public safety for our residents. As part of that commitment, we are pleased to share an important update regarding police services coverage.

Effective July 1, 2026, Village residents will see an increase in patrol coverage provided by the Outagamie County Sheriff's Office. This enhancement includes the addition of two deputies assigned specifically to the Village, covering the hours of 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. daily. Also occurring on July 1, 2026 is the introduction of an Outagamie County Patrol Lieutenant providing additional supervision and oversight. With this change, Outagamie County patrol coverage within the Village will extend from 5:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m.

Effective with the start of the 2026-2027 school year and beyond, Outagamie County Sheriff's Office will serve as the School Resource Officers for the Kimberly Area School District. An introduction of the School Resource Officers will be forthcoming from the District and shared by the Village of Kimberly.

The above changes are consistent with the Village's overall plan to fully transition to police service coverage with Outagamie County Sheriff's Department. In total, at the conclusion of the transition the Village will have eight patrol deputies, two sergeants/investigator and one lieutenant for dedicated service to Kimberly.

Our ongoing partnership with Fox Valley Metro Police Department remains in place and we transition through the dissolution. Residents should note that all existing phone numbers, emergency contacts, and non-emergency contact information remain unchanged. There is no impact to how residents request assistance or interact with law enforcement services.

The police services contract with Outagamie County is not intended to duplicate services or increase costs. Rather, it is a proactive step to maintain the level of safety, responsiveness, and visibility our community expects and deserves as the Village transitions out of its long-standing partnership with the Village of Little Chute. We appreciate the continued cooperation of our public safety partners and thank our residents for their support as we take these steps to ensure a smooth transition and continued high-quality police services.

PUBLIC SAFETY SPOTLIGHT

What is AI?

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is a technology that enables machines to mimic certain human-like behavior, such as speech or writing. AI, while a useful tool in some circumstances, can be exploited by bad actors to make scams more convincing.

Three Terms to Know

1. Chatbots:

A chatbot is a computer program that may use AI to simulate human conversation and could be used maliciously to obtain, store, or manipulate your personal data.

2. Voice Cloning Technology:

Voice cloning uses AI to mimic the voice of someone you may know.

3. Deepfakes:

A deepfake is an authentic looking AI-generated video or image.

AI-Powered Scams to Watch Out For

Phishing Attacks
Using AI, scammers can quickly personalize phishing emails, imitate dialogue, and bypass spam filters, making it harder for individuals to distinguish between genuine and fraudulent communications.

Family Emergency Scams
Scammers can utilize voice cloning and deepfakes to impersonate a loved one who claims they are in danger and need money.

Romance Scams
Fraudsters can use AI technology to operate fake profiles on dating websites and social media platforms. AI-powered chatbots then simulate realistic conversation to build trust, with the goal of tricking the target into sending them money.

Tips to Protect Yourself

- Do not share sensitive information via phone, email, text, or social media.
- Do not transfer or send money to unknown locations.
- Consider designating a "safe word" for your family that is only shared with family members and close contacts.
